From Patrick McMullen, PhD, PMPC President:

- This PMPC Activities Update is a short summary of the status of current PMPC priority. The Covid virus continues
  to add limitations to all our lives, and of course, to the public monitoring and Mountain Preserve protection
  activities of the PMPC. Our monitoring has expanded and continues with good coverage; through both in person
  monitoring of the Preserves and attending Zoom Meetings.

### PMPC Representatives are ACTIVELY MONITORING the following:

- The "Verdin" Housing Development Project (formerly the MacEwen 480): 480-acres adjacent to the west edge of the Cave Creek Wash and south of Sonoran Drive. Two washes are impacted by this proposed project.
- PMPC's concerns are focused on specific issues with "Verdin's" project:
  - While PMPC is not opposed to development of this parcel; development must be consistent with the Desert Character Overlay (DCO) zoning requirements and standards; which define and protect sensitive areas adjacent to the Cave Creek Wash; as approved by the City of Phoenix.
    - Residential development, permitted in Sub-District A, must be of a "very low density, scale and intensity" due to the "many washes to be maintained in an undisturbed condition crossing this area..." See Section 653, Phoenix City Zoning Ordinance.
    - This parcel is wedged between the north/south segments of the Sonoran Preserve. Mesquite Wash an important habitat for many desert species runs through the heart of this property. This development will intrude on Cave Creek Wash, to the east of the property; an important wildlife corridor connecting the two Preserves.
  - Verdin's proposed application "up-zones" the land, increases density, negatively impacts animal corridors and negates the DCO standards.
- Should the Verdin rezone be approved, PMPC believes this action will:
  - Seriously degrade the fragile desert ecosystems in this area;
  - Sever the existing wildlife connection between the two Preserves; and,
  - Set a dangerous precedent whereby future developers can easily bypass the DCO protections in place to protect our unique desert landscapes.
- PMPC wants the DCO maintained in its entirety without compromise. The
  DCO defines "the nature of development, maintaining undisturbed
  areas, and provide guidance for new development to occur within the
  context of the fragile undisturbed desert." Phoenix approved this DCO.
- It is our understanding, Verdin, the developer, has asked to be on the March 1, 2022, Desert View Village Planning Committee agenda.

### NEED NEW PMPC MEMBERS AND BOARD MEMBERS:

Another Covid impact is being felt on our members and volunteers, who support and participate in the PMPC organization and on the PMPC Board.

Our PMPC Public Meetings have been suspended and/or postponed; with the primary concern of Covid. Like so many other organizations and small businesses, our membership numbers are dropping; by about 25% - in addition - the number of active PMPC Board Members has also been reduced.

### PMPC Continues to ACTIVELY MONITOR:

### South Mountain Freeway 32 Acre Parcel:

The City of Phoenix has identified parcels for the 32acre land exchange; and this is currently under review. Public information outreach and input will be needed soon. PMPC will keep you informed.

### TRAIL #25 -- North Mountain to Lookout Mountain:

Official discussions continue with an ever-expanding coalition of people, who provide their input and support. Their goal is to cooperatively re-establish this 'natural surface' trail.

There is an issue related to one section of the proposed new route. The City of Phoenix is reaching out to the Moon Ridge Estate HOA; regarding a possible change in the route; or, possibly using the existing route that is on the HOA land. PMPC continues to monitor and participate in these ongoing discussions.

### Piestewa Peak Drought Pipeline Update:

PMPC continues to monitor the pathway of the drought pipeline through Piestewa Peak Preserve.

Construction continues on the water pipeline, and it includes work along the bike path near SR-51 north of Glendale. The water pipes are laid out and ready for installation; which is visible from SR-51. Current construction area includes installing new pipeline all the way to the north valley, and through the Dreamy Draw. Access to Dreamy Draw and Desert Preserve has been limited due to the current construction.
